March 2017 Business Meeting Summary,


Community Friends Monthly Meeting March 12, 2017 24 members were present

- 1. Opening Worship: "Quaker business process consisted of seeking God's will and allowing the meeting to be brought into unity by the immediate presence and active power of God. This early understanding required each participant in the meeting to cast aside personal agendas, pet ideas and political positions and in so doing to seek the divine will. It was incumbent on all present to allow God to challenge and change hearts and minds, and bring a miraculous divine unity, where before there were human strife and division. First we must consider our business meetings primarily prayer meetings. As we consider each item on the agenda, we must pray for God's will to be revealed, and conform our will to [that of God.] The goal should not be compromise, but instead transformation of hearts and attitudes." From Misunderstanding Quaker Faith and Practice, by Terry Wallace, Friends Journal, Jan 2007
- **2. Treasurer's Report**: We are a 12% of our expense on hand, exceeding our goal of 6%. This is due to a substantial check we received from a settlement of a lawsuit against Duke Energy.
- 3. Adult Religious Education: Met 3/5/17. Second hours are scheduled through June with a few openings here and there. ARE is facing a transition with both committee members having to step down before the end of their term and newly nominated members are encouraged to begin service early.
- **4. Unity with Nature Committee**: 20 people attended a screening of a documentary, Inhabit, on 3/10/17 at the meeting house, with 10 of these people being from outside of the meeting. The film was inspiring and encouraged good conversation.
- **5. Ministry & Counsel:** Committee approved a request from Marjorie Isaacs for a traveling companion as she travels to present her work on meditation for children. A companion was named. The committee continues to work on communication with lapsed or inactive members and the format for the threshing session to be held on 3/19/17 was set.
- **6. Outreach Committee**: Friends approved a cover design for the welcome sign-in book by Jennifer Wolff. They are looking into finalizing a brochure to be given to visitors and facilitating a visioning session to identify metaphors and symbols for the meeting.
- 7. Peace & Social Concerns: No Report.
- **8.** Ad Hoc Committee on Signage: The Ad Hoc committee had the following proposed actions: The first is that Meeting put up two signs, one on each end of the driveway, stating in English, Spanish, and Arabic "No matter where you are from, we're glad you are our neighbor." The signs are from available from a few locations and the cost is roughly \$7 per sign. Friends encouraged that we do a bulk order so that members can put them up at our homes as well. John Sniegocki volunteered to organize getting the signs. This action was approved. The second is that Community Friends Meeting signs on as a Cincinnati Sanctuary Solidarity Congregation. A Sanctuary Solidarity Congregation would support people in sanctuary, support sanctuary congregations, public witness, and congregational training. The importance of creating a line in the budget that would support this action and would insure that this would be more than a symbolic gesture. Many Friends spoke out of silence the actions they would be willing to do in order for our meeting to be able to make this commitment. The meeting approved becoming a Solidarity Congregation and creating a line in the budget for donations to support this work and seeding it with \$500 from our general fund.
- 9. Community Committee: A kitchen cleaning meeting will be held next Saturday afternoon.
- **10. Religious Development:** The committee met on March 5. Marjorie Isaacs attended to share the revised version of her beautiful book, Finding the Light in You: Bright Silent Worship with Young Friends, and to encourage the committee to use this approach with the children in our classes. We reviewed plans for purchasing mulch for the playground. Jim Rhein has been busy with maintenance in the basement. The committee is still trying to fill in a few teaching spots for the intermediate class. The primary class is covered for the rest of the year. Cecilia and Elana Branson have been helping out with child care.
- 11. Nominating Committee Report and Action: The Nominating Committee held a successful Second Hour discussion about service to the meeting and how best to support and staff our committees. Of particular concern was the Peace and Social Concern committee that is currently inactive due to lack of leadership. While not everyone agreed, there was a sense from many friends that this committee works as more of a support committee for members who are active in Peace and Social Concern groups outside of meeting. There was also a suggestion that Adult Religious Education could merge with Outreach. We don't feel that it is Nominating Committee's role to request action on these changes but did want to share the suggestions with the Meeting. Nominating Committee met on 3/10 to discuss the results of second hour and to begin nominating. Some vital roles that will need to be filled for the coming year are Assistant Recording Clerk, House and Grounds, Adult Religious Education, Peace and Social Concerns, and we need a photographer for the Newsletter and a reporter to the Quaker Quill. Nominating requests that the meeting approve Wilhelmina Branson as a Cannon Fund Trustee effective immediately. This was approved. Nominating

- **13. House and Grounds:** Meeting was held to get ready for the upcoming work day. The closer was installed on the door to the basement. There will be a new designated spot in the woods for compost debris larger than leaves. The electric work was completed. A final check for \$650 was paid by the caretakers and they will be reimbursed by the meeting. The dishwasher runs long so a sign will be added to tell you to use the express mode.
- 14. Library Committee: The library received a donation of the full 12 volumes of the Interpreter's Bible.
- **15. Tenderer Mercies**: The help and support of the meeting is greatly appreciated. Susan Gerke and Lynn Funck have increased their work in the past two months. It is under consideration to ask that people who are interested providing food are encouraged to attend a meal beforehand to get a feel for what is needed.
- 16. Miami Quarterly Meeting Report, MQM rotation schedule: Miami Quarterly Meeting met at Eastern Hills Meeting House on February 19, 2017. There was a program for adults provided by Lexington Monthly Meeting. The main issue that was addressed was making plans to lay down Green Plains Meeting and what to do with the historic meeting house and cemetery that belong to that meeting. The ad-hoc committee created to deal with it proposed that during the 10th Month Miami Quarterly Meeting we accept a minute laying down the meeting immediately after accepting a deed of transfer of the grounds, meetinghouse and burial grounds. Miami Quarterly is exploring partnering with Clark County Historical Society to offer tours and other possible uses for the property. The Meeting also approved the signing of an Amicus Brief in support of Transgender Rights. The next Miami Quarterly meeting will be Fifth Month 21st day at Miami Meeting with Oxford Monthly Meeting cohosting and Dayton Monthly Meeting providing Adult Program about the State of Society reports. The new rotation schedule through 2019 was presented.
- 17. Ohio Valley Yearly Meeting: There is a survey out on OVYM contributions to other organizations. It was sent via email and individuals are encouraged to complete it. The Youth Services committee is looking for a new youth secretary. It is a part time paid position that we are looking to fill ASAP. The committee has reached out to several Quaker colleges to advertise the position. If Friends know of someone who would be interested in applying please contact David Funck or Peter Hardy.
