Sanctuary/Solidarity Movement

Cincinnati Friends Meeting is nvolved in the Sanctuary/Solidarity Movement, which is led by the Cincinnati Sanctuary Congregation Coalition and supported by the AMOS Project. The coalition is made up of more than 20 area congregations of Christian, Jewish and Muslim traditions and aims to help undocumented immigrants find sanctuary in Cincinnati.

Although we lack the facilities to provide living space for immigrants in danger of deportation, we are committed to supporting those congregations that do. In addition to offering our love and spiritual support to those affected individuals and families in their time of need, we may also provide monetary aid, food, clothing, health and medical support, and legal and other support as we are able and called to do.

To show that we welcome all people, we have posted a sign in front of our meetinghouse and by our front door: No matter where you are from, we're glad you are our neighbor. This message appears in English, Spanish, and Arabic.

Community Friends Meeting Meeting for Business Twelfth Month 8, 2019

Present: Doug, Lisa, Mary Anne, Wilhelmina, Eira, Tim, Lynn, Paul, Jennifer Eric, Don, John

- 4. **Opening Worship:** The meeting opened with centering worship during which Doug, presiding clerk, read the following: "There is that near you which will guide you. O, wait for it, and be sure to keep to it..." Isaac Pennington
- 5. Clerk's Report: Doug noted that for many people, this is a hard, stressful time of year. He asked Friends to take a deep breath and remind ourselves to be spirit led.
- 6. Treasurer's Report: Lynn reported that we have good news: Friends have come forward with contributions in the past month! We received more than \$7,000 in contributions in the month of November. There was some question about the \$200 transfer to the Building Reserve Fund. Paul and Lynn will look at this question together to resolve the issue. We have 11% of expenses on hand now, with a goal of 6%. The treasurer's report was accepted with joy and gratitude.
- Stewardship Committee: Rich sent a report that the committee is still working on the 2020 budget and will bring the budget to the January business meeting for approval. The report was accepted.
- 8. Community Committee: (no report)
- 9. Report from Cincinnati Sanctuary Coalition: Mary Anne reported that the Congolese family has until June to obtain asylum status. A pro bono immigration lawyer has said he would take their case. Some translation challenges were resolved through translators from Eastern Hills Meeting, Xavier, Alliance Francaise, and the OLLI program. Mary Anne thanked everyone who has contributed in any way, including Hannah and her daughters who provided child care, and everyone

- who has contributed in any way, including Hannah and her daughters who provided child care, and everyone who gave donations and offered assistance. Thanks to generous meeting donations Mary Anne was able to drive them around, cook them some nutritious meals, get them a small Christmas tree, pay for lots of phone minutes, and enjoy the indoor playground at McDonald's. The report was accepted.
- Minute of Appreciation: The meeting approved a minute of appreciation for Mary Anne for all her time and work to support the needs of the Congolese family in the past week.
- 3. Ministry and Counsel: Lisa reported that the committee met on November 23 for their annual fall retreat at Lisa's home. Committee members spent some time sharing about their spiritual condition and life journeys and considering how they are living into their gifts to heal and transform the world. They also considered the spiritual life of the meeting, and what the committee could do to nurture it. They will be following up on several ideas that came up during this time of reflection, including a Second Hour on Faithfulness Groups, queries at the rise of meeting to stimulate spiritual reflection, holding space for worship at 10:00 on Sundays, and another Second Hour on the Gathered Meeting. During the business portion of the meeting, there were updates about ministry support committees and outreach contacts, and discussion of pastoral care needs. The retreat concluded with a potluck lunch and a fall walk in the woods. After the report, there was some discussion about the importance of protecting our worship time together on Sundays, by gathering promptly at 10:00 in silence. It was noted that worship begins when the first person enters the meeting room and sits in silence. Gathering together in silent worship is the central experience in the spiritual life of the meeting community. Some Friends do find inspiration from singing together before worship, but the singing should end by 10:00. Friends were advised to be sensitive to the different forms of worship that some may prefer,

- **15.** and needs of the differently abled, while maintaining respect for our central experience of gathered waiting worship.
- 16. **Minutes:** The minutes up to this point were approved.
- 17. Adult Religious Education Committee: Paul reported they have pretty much filled up the Second Hour dates through June. A special event with George Lakey is being planned Saturday May 23, ending with a shared meal. George Lakey is a Quaker author and activist and one of the founders of Quaker Earth Care Witness. Eastern Hills and Cincinnati Friends meeting will be specifically invited to this event. There may be some additional inreach groups starting in January. The report was accepted.
- 18. Religious Development Committee: Lisa reported that the committee did not meet, but they are organizing a Variety Show for the Christmas program on December 15. The clerk asked Friends to take pictures of this event for the newsletter! The report was accepted.
- 19. Unity with Nature Committee: (no report)
- **20. Library Committee:** (No report)
- **21. Outreach Committee:** (No report) The committee will meet this evening.
- 22. House and Grounds Committee: Eric reported the committee discussed the recent workday. They will be putting in a new refrigerator for the downstairs kitchen and will do plumbing work next year. Some new comfortable chairs were purchased for the meeting room. Friends were asked to try them out and let the committee know if we like them! The report was accepted.
- 23. Peace and Social Concerns Committee: Don shared that the committee will focus on state and local issues and will report later. The report was accepted.

- 10. **FCNL Lobbying Group:** Mary Anne shared that several people are interested in lobbying, but no one has stepped forward to organize the visits at this time. The report was accepted.
- 11. Tender Mercies: David F reported that the work is going very well, with the themed dinners each month. Many Friends are volunteering to prepare dishes and serve the meals. It is a gift to provide this outreach to the community for 12 years, and the relationships with residents of Tender Mercies are very rewarding. The report was accepted with great appreciation for the leadership of the Funcks in this ministry.
- 12. MARCC Delegates Council: Doug reported a priority planning meeting was held. MARCC's priorities align with our meeting's values. This organization is a powerful force in the metropolitan area. MARCC would like Community Friends Meeting to host an ID event, where residents of Cincinnati can obtain an alternate ID card which is accepted by the police and all local government agencies. Having this ID card helps make interactions with the police and agencies more respectful. Doug asked the Meeting to consider options for a Saturday when we can host such an event. There would be no cost to the meeting. The meeting **approved** allowing MARCC to use the Meetinghouse for this event. The report was accepted.
- 13. **Miami Quarterly Meeting:** (no report) Eric noted that the next joint quarterly meeting will be held Oct 17-18, 2020 at Happy Hollow Campground.
- 14. Ohio Valley Yearly Meeting: David reported that the next OVYM youth event will be the Quake that Rocked the Midwest over Martin Luther King weekend, hosted by Illinois Yearly Meeting. This is open to youth from any meeting and their friends. Eric Wolff reported from Executive Committee that committees were asked not to name members to their own committees, but to go through the nominating committee process. Budget & Finance is

- 24. considering including regular attenders in the proportional share, because even though yearly meeting membership is dwindling, attendance at meeting is not dropping. There is \$7,500 in the Yearly Meeting Benevolent Fund that can be requested for traveling in the ministry, etc. Background checks for people who work with children were discussed. The costs may be covered by OVYM if needed. Earth Care Committee is looking at having a tour of the farm at Earlham at the next yearly meeting sessions. The report was accepted.

- **26. Announcements:** Doug would welcome articles and pictures for the December Community Companion. Mary Anne asked that committees please request a budget amount from Stewardship Committee for the 2020 budget, as soon as possible.
- **27. Approval of Minutes:** The minutes were approved.
- **28.** Closing Worship: The meeting closed with silent worship.
