Summary draft of Meeting for Worship with Attention to Business

Second Month 14

Action item 1: Afghanistan War Minute:

The Religious Society of Friends is opposed to all wars. We do not accept the existence of just wars. On this basis we are opposed to increased U.S. military involvement in Afghanistan.

President Obama, however, argued in his address to the Nobel Committee that the war meets the test of traditional just war theory. Even on the assumption that wars may be just, the president did not make his case. All non-violent alternatives have not been attempted; there is no clear definition of what success in the war would mean; and the victims of the war are mostly innocent civilians, including women and children.

This being the case, we urge all senators and representatives to resist all attempts to appropriate money in support of the war in Afghanistan.

The minute was approved, and Clerk Doug Burks said it shall be passed on to the two Senators from Ohio, and the members of the House of Representatives from Southwest Ohio.

Action item 2: Window replacement proposal. Minute:

The meeting charges the House and Grounds Committee to see to the replacement of windows in the meeting house. Three steps are to be followed:

First: House and Grounds shall obtain estimates for the replacement of meeting house windows in whole and in part.

Second: House and Grounds Committee shall convene with the Stewardship Committee and the Friends in Unity with Nature Committee to explore the next steps after the estimates have been obtained.

Third: House and Grounds Committee shall report to the Monthly Meeting with a proposal for its consideration.

The minute was approved with the understanding that this process will be gradual and step-wise requiring periodic meetings of the three committees involved and periodic reports to the Monthly Meeting.

Action item 3: Acceptance of Rachel, Jason, and Tobias Dean into membership in the meeting, and the dropping of the youth membership of Devin Miller.

The Deans were approved for transferring their membership from Oxford Friends Meeting to Community Friends, and Devin Miller was dropped from his youth membership since he has reached the age of 25, and has not responded to communications with Ministry and Counsel regarding membership in the meeting.

Action Item 4: Gift Policy. The following policy was reviewed:

All donations except memorial gifts are assumed to be given to the general fund and the uses of those donations are used by the Meeting at its discretion. Donations of money or in kind gifts above \$250.00 that are restricted to a purpose must be approved by the Meeting before being accepted. The meeting periodically sets campaigns for specific purposes and gifts of any size are accepted to those campaigns.

Donations and bequests of Stock, bonds, commodities and other securities are accepted and are sold by the meeting with the proceeds being placed into Meeting accounts.

Memorial gifts (in memory of deceased Friends) given to the meeting are placed into the building reserve fund unless a specific restriction is placed on the gift by the family or the donor.

The following is an interpretive summary of the discussion. It combines discussion of this policy statement, and discussion of the treasurer's report below: The discussion of this policy centered on the issue of the rightfulness of allowing the building reserve fund to grow at the expense of the current and concrete work of the meeting. After lengthy consideration, it was decided to stay with the current policy, and come back to reckon with the issue in the near future. To facilitate this the Ministry and Counsel committee was asked to schedule and moderate a meeting-wide threshing session on financial values, budgeting, and stewardship in the meeting, including the procedures we follow – or ought to follow – when we make decisions about capital and spending. These are complicated issues, and merely naming and clarifying them would be an important first step that hopefully might support the meeting in living out its financial and stewardship responsibilities.

Action Item 5: Minutes of appreciation.

- A. The Meeting is appreciative of the hard and effective work done by Kate Anthony on the Fall Renewal, held at the meeting house on 9/19/09. The day was particularly worthwhile for combining two of Kate's special gifts: spiritual practice, and care of the environment. A variety of approaches to reflecting on our spiritual journeys were introduced and practiced in the morning, and in the afternoon all in attendance worked on the house and grounds.
- B. The meeting appreciates the work of Eileen Bagus on obtaining seasoned friends Patricia Thomas and Cathy Barney to lead members of the three local Friends Meetings in a day of renewal at the meeting house on 2/13/2010 on the theme of "Spiritual Companionship." Opening our meeting to other Friends Meetings has been an important addition to the work of the meeting, and Eileen has been a significant catalyst for this work.

Both minutes were warmly approved.

Reports:

1. The Cannon Fund report was presented by Carol Burks and approved.
2. The treasurer's report (in addition to the following notes, please refer to the discussion of gift policy above) During the treasurer's report the question was raised about how one might gain meeting approval for meeting gifts to charitable causes. Clerk Doug Burks clarified this point by advising members to make recommendations for such gifts to the Peace and Social Concerns Committee. As much as possible, these requests are integrated into the yearly budgeting process. Treasurer Mary Anne Curtis said that another way to give gifts through the meeting would be to independently raise money for the gift, and work with the treasurer to make sure that the donation is made.
3. The Caretakers, John Sniegocki, Elizabeth Groppe, and their son John David were commended for their work of hand-shoveling much of the driveway and the walks as the snow-blower was broken. It had been repaired.
4. The Peace and Social Concerns Committee reported that their session with IJPC at the meeting house last week was snowed out. There will probably be another occasion for such a meeting, and the committee requested that the meeting consider endorsing IJPC's proposal for the school board to limit military recruiters' access to students in the schools.
5. The House and Grounds committee submitted a lengthy written report. Written reports were also filed by the Community Committee, and the Adult Education Committee.

Quaker Bolivia Link

I am writing to encourage Friends to consider reinstituting our small annual (\$25) donation to Quaker Bolivia Link. After recently traveling in South America, I am impressed with how energy and optimism can survive in the face of the same tough struggles that we North Americans also are beginning to see. We have much to learn from keeping up our ties with those who also walk the path of keeping unity and hope in their communities and families.

Living simply is a Quaker testimony. Equality is a Quaker testimony. Staying realistic is my personal testimony. Quaker Bolivia Link is a road to all of these dreams, especially as our young people learn the global way of thinking.

According to their literature, the success of QBL is due to their team of technicians in La Paz. The team is made of up Bolivians, most of whom speak the Aymara language. They have worked their way through university and graduated as agricultural technicians. They design, supervise, and monitor QBL's projects.

QBL has built over 300 greenhouses in several villages on the cold, arid Altiplano. In a region where malnutrition is widespread, these are providing a permanent supply of healthy vegetables. QBL builds community irrigation and drinking water systems. This combats water-borne sickness and parasites that especially hit the children and elderly. Quaker chicken and cattle breeding programs have supplied protein to remote communities. These projects should be steadfastly maintained.

If all we can afford is a little, we should give a little. Simplicity, equality, integrity, and the Inner Light are all served by this effort. I don't ask blind faith but rather surrendering to the simple reality that it is a little less hard to get by when we all stick together and let our Light shine.

Reflections on what Quakers bring to the Ecumenical Table

“Are the other churches ready to hear what we have to say? ... For when we start to state our position positively we are putting forward a very serious challenge. For we are talking about Christianity as a way of life which puts God at the center and sees dependence on the Holy Spirit as a daily gift. Thus, baptism with water is unnecessary because the Spirit baptizes all those who respond to the Light; outward ritual in worship is unnecessary because true worship waits on God to receive the power and inspiration of the Spirit; the Spirit ordains those who are to speak and this ordination lasts for as long as the message is being delivered. There is no creed because the Spirit cannot be fettered by words; whether someone is a Christian is shown by the quality of a faithful life rather than by what is said or believed. ... Let us pull Quakers up from being the footnote and bring them to the center of the page. For once the Quaker perspective is recognized and accepted, the whole discussion of unity and diversity is changed, indeed turned on its head, for most of the former questions become useless and have to be replaced. The central questions then become: how do we recognize the Holy Spirit at work in this church? how is Christian witness manifest in its life?”
