 - It was explained that while contributions to FCNL are not tax deductible, gifts to the FCNL Education Fund are tax deductible.

Action Items:

- A minute was proposed by the Peace and Social Concerns Committee to support the Occupy movement. After Tim Leonard read it and some discussion it was APPROVED with several changes. The Clerk will do a press release and deliver the minute to Occupy Cincinnati.
- o The 2012 Budget: The budget was APPROVED, with minor changes.
- Treasurer's Report: Some money came in. The Teen Trip Fund contribution was made by the Youth Ministry Fund. The Cannon Fund owes us \$40. The bank balance/annual budget ratio is 9%, where the goal is 10%. The treasurer's report was ACCEPTED, with gratitude.

• Committee Reports:

- Peace & Social Concerns: Marjorie Isaacs reported- The lobbying workshop was quite successful. Campaign Finance Reform is a coming major issue.
- Stewardship: Marjorie Isaacs reported: A Stewardship committee meeting is planned for 12-13-11. We are in the process of forecasting financial needs related to Community Friends doing outreach through Quaker Quest activities as well as FUN Committee's recommendations for additional steps to green retrofit the Meetinghouse.
- o Music Committee: Eugenia Mills reported that the new piano tuning is better.

Peace and Social Concerns: submitted by Marjorie Isaacs

We hold continued concern about the impact of a series of US Supreme Court decisions, particularly Citizens United (January 2010). This series of decisions make money a form of free speech and give corporations and unions the rights of individual people. This past fall our committee prepared a minute on how these Supreme Court decisions necessitate true campaign finance reform. After MFWAB approved the minute, clerk Frank Huss sent it to FCNL and it was posted on their blog. We also sent the minute to all of the other monthly meetings in OVYM; Dayton and Miami responded by sending their own minutes of support about Citizens United to FCNL. As a result Citizens United/Campaign finance reform became a priority of FCNL "as way opens" now, and will be considered for higher priority next November at FCNL's biennial priority setting November 2012 meeting.

Study Group- Quakerism: A theology for Our Time led by Paulette Meier

This group is a very committed one, meeting at 8:45 <u>before</u> meeting for worship. The book: *Theology for Our Time* by Patricia A. Williams is used. Sue Brungs states that the biggest problem is that there is never enough time. We are only on chapter 3 and we have met 5-6 times! On a positive note, she states that it has given her a chance to get to know others more deeply as they discuss their religious backgrounds. The group is very diverse in age, gender and theological backgrounds. It meets both social and intellectual needs.

Pam Richards says that the group has been very rewarding "It is interesting to bring our religious backgrounds to Quakerism and look at the residuals that we bring to Quakerism". For example, the Church of Christ practically worships the Bible and is very literal and rational. She struggles to determine when God is calling her beyond the literal scripture. She is rethinking what she was taught in the religion she was raised. She finds the group is making steps towards finding common ground in our beliefs and determining why we are here and not somewhere else.

Some of you may remember a visit from Ruah Swennerfelt, former executive secretary of Quaker Earthcare Witness. Since recently retiring, she has been "on a search for answers to the question of how our civilization will survive the current 'perfect storm' of peak oil, climate disruption, and economic contraction. We live in a world economic system that requires perpetual growth to survive. This is not sustainable since Earth's resources are limited. My search most recently took me to Israel, the Palestinian Territories, Europe, and North America. Like a quilt, each piece (each Transition initiative I visited) was unique and beautiful on its own, but the finished quilt is something greater than the parts."

Our goal is to support Friends working in the Transition Movement. Low carbon future for Quakers

British Friends Commit to Low Carbon Future, News Release 05 August 2011

Quakers in Britain have today committed their whole movement to becoming a low-carbon, sustainable community. They have always tried to lead simple lives but this decision goes further. It means every Quaker in Britain will be urged and supported to reduce their carbon footprint.

Low carbon future for Quakers each other to account to achieve it. "We can no longer ignore the fact that our planet is finite," say Quakers. "We have not only inherited the earth from our ancestors: we have borrowed it from our children and from their children."

More than 1,500 Quakers made the decision gathered at the University of Kent in Canterbury for their annual Yearly Meeting to discern the way ahead for Quakers in Britain. The eight-day programme for all ages, from 30 July to 6 August, was an inspiring mix of worship, business, spiritual growth and fun. Recording Clerk Paul Parker said: "We met to grow in the Spirit. We listened to God and we discovered with certainty that what the world needs of us at this time is to change our lives. Our decision is exciting. This involves every child, every adult, every person in our Quaker community."

The decision is rooted in Quakers' longstanding work for a peaceful and more equal world. Quakers understand that many global problems are connected: speakers during the week highlighted the fact that the environmental crisis is inextricably linked with global economic injustice. The meeting also decided to challenge the values of consumer capitalism and engage with politicians and other decision makers to develop policies to safeguard people and planet. "We believe this corporate action will enable us to speak truth to power more confidently," says the minute recording the decision.

Kabbalah Study Group at Cincinnati Friends Meeting

Jeff Arnold and Jim Crocker-Lakness are organizing a study group on the Kabbalah, a traditional form of Jewish mysticism. The focus of the group is two-fold: We hope to intellectually understand what Kabbalah is from a historical standpoint; and to help each other find ways to apply its ideas to our personal spiritual growth. The group will meet monthly on Monday or Tuesday evening. It will be a leaderless group with responsibility for guiding discussion shared by participants.

Jim and Jeff claim no expertise in the Kabbalah and will be learning along with everyone else. Several inexpensive introductory books are available that we can read to generate discussion.

Our first meeting will be on January 23 at 7:00 in the library at the Cincinnati Friends Meetinghouse, 8075 Keller Road. We will introduce ourselves, share our individual interests in Kabbalah, determine format and guidelines for meetings, and decide a regular meeting day, time and place.
