## December 8, 2013 Business Meeting Summary prepared by Paul Buckley, Recording Clerk

The meeting opened with twenty Friends present.

The treasurer reported that contributions to the meeting are still about \$5000 behind budget. Some expenses are also down relative to budget, but not enough to offset the shortfall in income. In the next month, we will be paying more than \$5000 in the donations to other organizations.

### **Contributions to the meeting are needed to balance our budget.**

We are behind schedule in drafting a budget for 2104. Committee clerks are asked to let the treasurer know what they need to do their work in the coming year as soon as possible.

Committee clerks were also reminded that year end reports will be needed so that the State of the Meeting Report can be compiled. These should be sent to the clerk of Ministry & Counsel Committee by the end of January.

The new website hosted on the FGC Quaker Cloud was demonstrated by the Web Clerk.

Everything of value from our old website has been ported over and additional information has been added (e.g., electronic copies of the *Community Companion* from 2006 to the present).

For privacy, some information on the website (minutes, photo galleries, etc.) only be visible to the meeting's members and attenders and thus require signing in with a password. When items are posted they will be designated as either public or private. Friends are encouraged to create accounts so they will be able to view everything posted. If any difficulties are encountered, contact the web clerk.

Currently, only the web clerk can contribute material to the News, Events and Resources sections. Anyone with an account can post to the Community section. Soon, however, the contributor role will be granted to others in the meeting so the task of maintaining the site is shared by more people.

The Adult Religious Education Committee's proposed a statement of purpose was accepted. The statement, as edited last month, is:

“The purpose of the Adult Religious Education Committee is to identify the religious and spiritual education needs of Community Friends Meeting, and to plan Second Hour or other events to meet those needs. The committee also coordinates the calendar of meeting second hour events initiated by meeting committees or members.”

The Ministry & Counsel Committee met on November 25 to consider ways to provide support to the Presiding Clerk in maintaining a worshipful process during meetings for business. The committee heard reports from ministry support committees and responded to a request for a clearness and support committee, and discussed the pastoral care needs in the Meeting.

The House & Grounds Committee plans to purchase a new mower by spring. They also expressed appreciation to the caretakers for shoveling the meetinghouse drive by hand.

Friends were reminded to use the meeting calendar if they wish to have heat when they use the meetinghouse.

The business meeting closed with a period of worship.

## Olney Friends Protects Pastures for Posterity - a Plea for Partners

Olney Friends School in Barnesville, Ohio decided not to lease rights to potentially rich oil and gas reserves under its land for hydraulic fracturing, or "fracking." In so doing, the school aligned itself with a tradition of environmental stewardship echoed in many Friends organizations. It also declined hundreds of thousands of dollars in guaranteed compensation. Still, the school's mission will flourish with financial support from Friends. .

. . Quaker testimonies of community, simplicity, service and stewardship - all intimately connected - shone vibrantly in this process (of discerning how to advance the school's mission while balancing Quaker principles with financial health). In making the decision to forego the riches of fracking and to attempt to save the riches of the earth literally beneath the school and community, Olney Friends School positioned itself as a leader in environmental stewardship.

John Woolman could not foresee the scale and complexity of the world's economies or ecologies, but he set the stage for a tradition of stewardship more than two centuries ago. The school reaches out to Friends now to help it move forward in the Light, and to transform its convictions into opportunities to strengthen the school's future. ## Yule Ritual

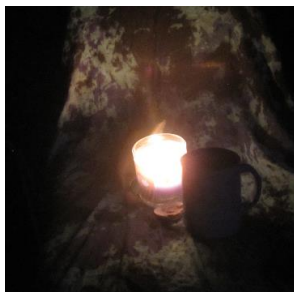

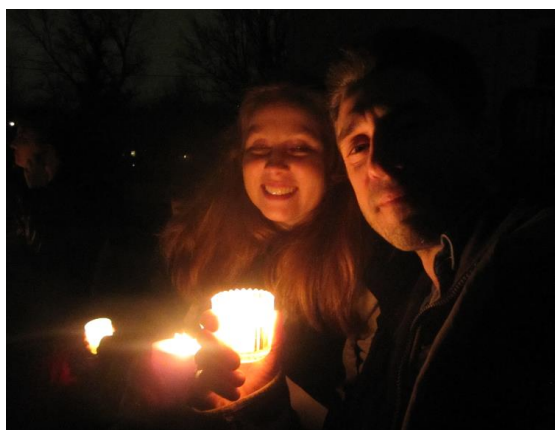
